INTRODUCTION

Under the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief II Fund (ESSER II), authorized by the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations (CRRSA) Act, the Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE) awards grants to School Districts and Charter Schools to address the impact that Novel Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) has had, and continues to have, on elementary and secondary schools across the state.

The LEA determines that the most urgent educational needs of the school district, as a result of COVID-19, are increased student technology, supports for Special Education and ELL students, as well as training and equipment for safety and security/managing diseases.

Please explain the LEA(s) proposed timeline for providing services and assistance to students and staff. (3000 characters max)

The determined needs of the school district began when Pennsylvania schools were given the mandate to close buildings on March 12th. At that time, the timeline for remote instruction began for both Morrisville schools. Morrisville staff was given directives and support to create lessons, for all students, that allowed teachers to review material learned and to promote student engagement and differentiation. Professional Development was provided to all staff. In September 2020 until the present time, the district has been operating in a virtual format and supporting students and staff with technology, professional learning, as well as Special Education supports and services on an ongoing basis.

Please explain the extent to which the LEA intends to use ESSER II funds to promote remote learning. (3000 characters max)

The Morrisville School District intends to use ESSER II funds to fully promote remote learning and to support a safe environment in which to learn. The technology funded through this grant will support the distance learning structure, as well as support a return to in-person instruction. The academic needs of all students are supported through the use of technology in the hands of every Morrisville student; differentiation for all levels of student needs can be achieved through the use of standards-based, educational online programs.

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Please describe how the LEA intends to assess and address student learning gaps resulting from the disruption in educational services. (3000 characters max)

The LEA intends to assess and to address student learning gaps caused by the disruption in educational services in several ways. Morrisville School District will use the purchased "Linkit Benchmark Software" to identify, design, and facilitate the targeted needs of our students' academic growth. The remote learning, academic programs purchased will prepare students for the upcoming school year. The previous grade level material, which was modified due to COVID, will continue in focus and depth until skill base is assessed. Learning objectives will solidify the skills needed for academic success, thus promoting a comfortable learning environment for the remainder of the 2020-2021 School Year.

Areas of emphasis should include:

- Documenting learning loss associated with extended school closure;
- Outlining the development of local continuity of education plans over the course of emergency response efforts; and
- Detailing supports for vulnerable student populations and families.

Morrisville has procedures in place for evaluating the local COVID-19 impact on student academic programming and delivery. The LEA intends to purchase additional chrome books to meet the needs of those students who do not have digital devices at home, as well as to provide wireless Internet for those without access. The most vulnerable of the student population are the first group to be given all materials needed to be actively engaged in academic study and communication with teachers and staff. Interactive platforms, used by every instructor, allows student work to be evaluated. Consequently, teachers can identify skills that have been impacted through COVID-19 school closures and structure learning to support student needs.

Morrisville School District has a core set of strategies that will be used to guide local investment of CARES funding timelines. The purchase of Linkit! benchmarking software will provide educators with the ability to triage and to pinpoint student strengths and challenges and support the actions of our Continuity of Education plans in a manner consistent with our MTSS approach. Through the use of this benchmarking software, teachers can efficiently drill

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down to target student needs, create/provide support, and monitor student growth in remote learning. This data is critical in academic student achievement goals. We will also enhance our existing WiFi capabilities to support students who wish to remain in a virtual environment as we progress to an in-person learning model (teachers teaching from the school building)

Please describe specific plans, measures, and longer-term evaluative strategies concerning student learning gaps - as well as opportunity to learn factors - stemming from COVID-19. (3000 characters max)

The LEA recognizes the critical need for longer-term evaluative strategies concerning student learning gaps, which have been a result of COVID-19. Consequently, the purchase of online, standard based curriculum will be an extension of our current Continuity of Education Plan. It will allow the district to provide flexible instructional days for our students in the event of future school closings (inclement weather or pandemic related). Students will be able to communicate with teachers and access classroom activities. Teachers can evaluate each students' work and specifically address individual strengths and needs. This funding will also be used to deliver Covid Compensatory Supports and Services for students who demonstrate significant gaps as a result of COVID-19.
